Fourth and Fifth floors completed

The Mental Health and Medical Command departments have now moved into their new spaces on the fourth and fifth floors after they were completely gutted and new spaces were built to better accommodate them. Both departments had offices spread out all over the Medical Center and now they are consolidated to their own floors.

“This was an important part of this renovation project to consolidate departments to be more effective and efficient in their operations,” said Jeremy Cobb, USACE Resident Engineer.

Both departments have been in Temporary Swing Space trailers since January 2012, and after more than two years they moved into their new renovated spaces on June 2, 2014.

“The re-location of the Executive Staff of the Medical Center was smoothly executed,” said Col. Penelope Gorsuch, Deputy Commander, Wright-Patterson Medical Center. “The staff were informed well in advance of the move dates which allowed for each office area to be prepared to transition back the main building in the new Command Section.

The Mental Health Department on the fourth floor includes 19,700 square feet of space including 51 individual provider offices, two shared provider offices, a psychological observation room, a psychological test room, a substance abuse test

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room, a biofeedback room, a virtual room, two group therapy rooms with modern audio and video equipment, two tech work areas, one tech triage room, a conference room/lounge, a child observation room and an elevator lobby, reception, waiting and child play areas.

On up on the fifth floor, Medical Command has moved into 18,500 square feet of space that includes 56 offices, two conference rooms and a new lobby and waiting area.

“The areas are very professionally crafted and are of an efficient design,” said Gorsuch. We received excellent support from both the contractor and our own facility staff to ensure we were back to work as soon as possible. We are already seeing the benefit of having the Command Staff back into the hospital. It was an overall positive experience.”
